Liturgy of the Word

Spend a little time during the week preparing the readings for next week, Trinity Sunday.

First Reading Deuteronomy 4: 32-34, 39-40

God, the creator, guided the destiny of his chosen people to show himself as a saving God and to make this beloved people a sign of salvation to all.

Second Reading Romans 8:14-17

Through the Holy Spirit of God in us, we know that we are children of the Father in heaven and called with God's Son, the Risen Christ, to be heirs to a future world.

Gospel Matthew 28:16-20

We are the missionary people of God, baptised in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. We come from God and with Christ alive among us we have to lead the world to God.

"The Holy Spirit".

I think I always enjoyed the idea of going to school – of learning and finding out about all sorts of things. I think I was very fortunate to have the opportunity to spend a lot of my life learning and I still spend a lot of time reading – I always have several books on the go! But the reality is that I long ago discovered what the ancient Greeks knew – that the more we know the more we realise how little that is in the big picture! I couldn't begin to grasp the vast amount of information there is in the world regarding the planets and the stars, the extraordinary complexity of human life and the brain, the great processes that make up climate and the living world. Reality and all there is, are simply too vast to begin to comprehend in any real way. And that is also true about another significant aspect of my life – the reality of God!

I have struggled – and still struggle – with reading and pondering theology – the science of understanding God and the things of God. and that should not surprise me – when I contemplate the vastness of the world and all the cosmos, I know that my simple little mind is not big enough to hold it all together and comprehend it – and it is even more certain that my tiny human mind cannot grasp the vastness of God – the one who is origin and creator of all that there is – including me of course! The human brain and mind simply cannot grasp the greatness of God by its own power. However that task does not depend on our own paltry efforts.

Whatever we know about God and the things of God are ultimately revealed by God and our task is "simply" to receive it and make it part of our life and live it out. We all know of the great revealing that God has made through scripture and the teaching of those who have gone before us, the things we have heard and appreciated, and ultimately the definitive revelation that is the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. But this week's great feast of Pentecost assures us that God's revelation to us is something that is ongoing, not just in the wide world, but in our own personal life. When we were baptised, when we were confirmed the Holy Spirit – the very presence of God – was given to us, put in our hearts and lives, and abides there. Like so much that is in our lives and part of us, we may well not be aware of it, we may well not refer to it, we may not bother with it in the midst of all the other things going on, and yet the truth is that the Holy Spirit is with us and in us, and the wisdom and gifts of God are available to us, but it is through prayer and desire that the Spirit can come to us - if we want to understand even a little of the world we live in we have to engage with it – if we want to come to know and understand the things of God it is even more essential that we engage with the presence of the Holy Spirit poured out on us.

May God bless all our parish community this season, confirm us in our faith as we invite the Holy Spirit to transform our lives as he did at Pentecost.

Sunday 19th May Pentecost Sunday

Acts 2:1-11 Ps 103 Gal 5:16-25 Jn 15:26-27; 16:12-13

Pentecost concludes the season of Easter with the celebration of the outpouring of the Spirit. The church therefore offers us the opportunity to celebrate this great feast in a very solemn way. The first option given in the missal is for a solemn vigil which in some ways mirrors the Easter vigil in terms of the extended liturgy of the word with Old Testament readings, psalms and special prayers. Where communities have a well-developed liturgical tradition this option could indeed be a rich experience where the significance of this solemnity could be opened up to the faithful. The story of Babel, the account of the theophany on Sinai, the vision of the dry bones and the prophecy of Joel all give an opportunity to explore the (inevitably) mysterious working and effects of the Holy Spirit.

Even if the simple form of the Vigil is used, any of these readings can offer profound insights into how the Holy Spirit can be perceived. The readings of the day offer two different accounts of the giving of the Spirit - the account from Luke of the upper room from Acts, and the giving of the Spirit by Jesus on the evening of Easter day from John. It is worth considering the tension which two such very different accounts might present. The workings of God cannot be contained in simple human categories of time and space, and this should emphasise both the mystery and reality of the Holy Spirit which is articulated in the rich language, analogies and images that have been employed throughout the Christian tradition. It is the very essence of God as Holy Spirit that the person of the Spirit may not be restricted and contained by language and human constructs. That may be a limit to our understanding, but the Spirit is, inevitably, beyond comprehension and so we are invited always to enter deeper into mystery. The reading from Paul to the Corinthians, or the reading to the Galatians as an option for the year B give us a way of perceiving the Spirit in the effects that the Spirit brings and such effects are surely able to be experienced, recognised and spoken about. That has been the reality that the faithful have known since the first Pentecost.

For reflection

Do you feel that in the Church there is a real sense of the presence of the Holy Spirit?

Do you feel that you have received the Holy Spirit in baptism and confirmation? How does that manifest itself?
