Liturgy of the Word

Spend a little time during the week preparing the readings for next week, the Fifth Sunday of Easter.

First Reading Acts 9:26-31

From a fanatic persecutor, Paul becomes a zealous apostle. At the beginning he is distrusted, Barnabas vouches for him and Paul is accepted, but even then he stirs up controversies.

Second Reading 1 John 3:18-24

We are certain that God is present in us and that we are united with him if we believe in Jesus Christ and love one another with a real and active love.

Gospel John 15:1-8

Only when we are united with Jesus in faith and love, like branches on a vine, can our lives be fruitful and God will give us everything that is good.

"Confirmation".

On Easter Sunday morning here Efrain was baptised at the main Sunday Mass, so there were many present who could be part and pray for the new member of our community. The parents and godparents made solemn promises to lead and support him in his faith. And although Efrain was very attentive and looked like he was enjoying the attention and happy to be there, we know that he probably didn't take a lot in – and certainly none of the significance of his baptism.

Baptism is the foundational Christian sacrament; it makes us daughters and sons of God and brothers and sisters with one another and with Christ; that is why it has such a high profile in our Liturgy. Think of the renewal of baptismal promises we made over Easter, the solemn blessing of the water at the Easter Vigil, the prominent place the font has in our church, think of the way we sprinkle holy water at funerals, and how we dip our hands into the holy water stoop as we enter church and make the sign of the cross.

So we have to learn what baptism does for us – as Efrain will do – and we learn that by living in a community of faith and sharing that faith and learning from one another and from the scriptures and teaching of the Church – and that community is primarily our parish. At some point as we grow up, we come to accept that faith and try to live it, not based on the faith of our parents and godparents, but by our own choice. If you think back, you may well remember something about the time when that happened to you.

That transition from simply receiving faith passively to embracing it actively is celebrated in the Church by the sacrament of confirmation – the individual 'confirms' for themselves their baptism. It may be a gradual process or something striking and significant, but it is important, because it is not only a decision by the individual, but it is also a source of grace and power to live the Christian life. Over the next few weeks in the Liturgy we will hear a lot about the Holy Spirit and the power of God that is made present. That power, given in baptism to Efrain, will be confirmed in the sacrament of confirmation – as it was in you and me.

This weekend nineteen young people from Leweston, Sherborne Boys' School, and Sherborne School for girls will be confirmed at Leweston. They are taking responsibility for their faith – the faith given in baptism. Pray for them, ask God to give them the power of the Holy Spirit, and ask God to make that power alive in your lives too.

May God bless all our parish community this Eastertide and confirm us in our faith as we celebrate the Lord's gift of the Spirit to his beloved daughters and sons.

Bible reference for the readings for this Sundayand a short reflection from Fr Robert

Sunday 21st April Fourth Sunday of Easter Acts 4:8-12 Ps 117 1Jn 3:1-2 Jn 10:11-18

Chapter 10 of John's gospel contains the extended 'parable' of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. This powerful image is redolent with Old Testament echoes (Ezekiel chapter 34, Psalm 22 (23), David the shepherd etc.) and is present too in the synoptic tradition. Part of this discourse is used each year on the fourth Sunday of Easter when "Good Shepherd Sunday" is a day of prayer for vocations. Today's passage emphasises the way in which the shepherd (Christ) knows his sheep personally and lays down his life for them. The Paschal Mystery is presented very much as something that is deliberately embraced out of love – love of the Father for the Son, and love of the Son for the threatened flock. Jesus willingly "lays down his life" for his sheep and can "take it up again". That is precisely the tone that John adopts in his account of the Passion which we heard on Good Friday. The reference to the "other sheep I have that are not of this fold" can be taken as referring to a universal mission, the extension of the invitation beyond Israel, and is also used regularly as an imperative to the unity of Christians. John's gospel is always written on a large scale, and his vision is always vast. Those who accept the call to follow - especially those who also take up a role as pastors - should never expect to find a cosy niche; they may not actually lay down their lives, but there will always be personal cost - because Jesus in John's gospel always calls his followers further.

For reflection

Do you feel Jesus the Good Shepherd is calling you go out of your "comfort zone" to help the lost sheep?

Does the idea of Jesus being both the Good Shepherd, but also the lamb of sacrifice encourage you to ponder your faith?

This 2-hour event will hear from a speaker about modern slavery in our Diocese and how we are called to respond and follow with group discussions and a Q&A with an expert panel.
